In the Know about Finances

President Ray Schut called the meeting to order at 11:15.

<u>Opening Devotion</u> - Pastor Michael Molland gave a devotion based on the book of Jeremiah and verses 31: 31-34 followed by a prayer.

<u>Secretaries Report</u>: Motion was made by Carla Middlen, seconded by Jon Cisar to approve the minutes from the February 18, 2024, Council Meeting. Motion Carried.

<u>President's Report</u>: President Schut presented the results of the congregational survey. The results were similar between the congregation and the church leadership. Eight areas are listed as being at risk, ten areas with low scores, fifteen areas with medium scores, and three areas of high scores. The council had a discussion on the report and how to improve the areas that need improvement. The summary is to be presented in the newsletter.

<u>Pastors' Report</u>: Pastor Nelson reported in a written report that Nona Bixler is now a permanent front office volunteer, and that Devon O'Neal has agreed to Chair the Bereavement Committee. Also, we are still looking for youth committee members to form the committee. Sara Benning is working with our ELCA Youth convention. A New Member Coordinator is still needed.

The congregation needs to form a Stewardship Taskforce to plan and implement our new program. There have been many funerals this last month. There are four weddings planned for the rest of 2024 and one in 2025. The Worship Committee has suggested changes in the worship services that are being implemented.

The new sound system is operating with the congregation providing positive feedback. Lenten services conclude this week and Fifth Grade First Communion will happen on Maundy Thursday.

<u>Financial Report</u>: Brenda Schut, Treasurer, and Wayne Wosje, Business Manager, presented the following financial report: Revenue month to date is \$2,100.00 ahead of 2023. Year to date we are \$4,300.00 behind 2023. Expenses month to date we are \$13,000.00 behind budget compared to 2023 being \$17,600.00 behind. Year to date expenses is \$28,000.00 behind budget compared to \$42,900.00 in 2023.

Expenses are higher than expected for office equipment (computer / copier), also air conditioning repairs from 2023 billed this last month. We discussed upcoming facility repairs and improvements that we have allocated funds for.

Carla Middlen moved; Todd Brower seconded to approve the Treasurers report. Motion Carried.

<u>New Business</u>: The council discusses how we are the interact with the people and organizations in our neighborhood. This is an ongoing study and discussion.

Council discussed the Call Process and will return to discussion next council meeting when Pastor Nelson is present.

<u>Committees:</u> Stewardship & Visioning – Jon Cisar is collaborating with Pastor Nelson to appoint a Stewardship Task force. The program will begin in April.

Education Committee – The new Woman's Bible Study Thursdays at 10 am is growing in numbers each week.

Property – Todd Brower reported on the status of repairs to the boiler. He has received several bids for sidewalk/curb and gutter replacement for the east and south sides of the church.

Outreach – Danielle reported in a written report that East Side helped with the food distribution from food to you. 138 families receive food that evening. Most were working poor families and expressed their thanks for the food. Donations are coming in for the 40 in 40 days Lenten collections.

Evangelism – Brian Ensberg talked about intentional evangelism and how our congregation can use this in our follow-up with both members and visitors.

Fellowship – Carla Middlen on the large turnout for Bingo. She also reported on the upcoming Egg-Stravaganza.

President Schut adjourned the meeting at 12:55 pm

I suggested that we should have an explanation of what St. Arbucks is about. Given this task, I got to write an article about St. Arbucks.

St. Dysmas is a long-time, wonderful partner to our congregation, whose office is located right in our building. Please see the important message below from Pastor Jeff.

"Remember the Sabbath to keep it holy; but where?"

Greeting from your sisters and brothers in Christ behind the walls of the SD State Penitentiary system!

With all the conversation that is going on about building a new men's prison, one question that I am repeatedly asked is, "will there be a chapel?" That is a very good question!

As chaplains to the various state facilities, we met with Deputy Secretary of Corrections, Doug Clark last fall and were told that there would be a space for chapel, but that it would be a multi-purpose space (i.e., an empty room that can be used by anyone, including DOC to use at their desire). In conversation with staff in Sioux Falls, they, too, have only been told that there would be space for chapel to happen; no details of what that would look like. Those of you that have visited St Dysmas knows the beautiful space of Hope Chapel inside the SDSP. We are blessed to have this space dedicated to our gathering for worship.

As I have talked about this in my travels to congregations around the state of South Dakota, it has become increasingly apparent that having a dedicated chapel, like we currently have in our existing facilities, is a strong desire of the people of South Dakota. Statistics show that having good religious access and practices not only make the institution safer for those incarcerated and staff, but greatly impacts the problem of recidivism (returning to prison).

In a recent conversation with the Tuesday morning coffee group here at Eastside, I was asked to talk a little about this, and they asked, "how can we help?"

The best way to get involved is to talk to or write your elected officials; your legislators, the Governor, and the Secretary of Corrections. These are the decision makers for our corrections practices. A sample letter and the contact addresses are available at the church office. Secondly, talk about it with others; grass roots advocacy starts with a conversation. And lastly, to pray about it, give this to God, that he may make paths for a dedicated chapel to be part of our corrections practices in South Dakota.

Please know this; we are grateful for your partnership and all of the ways that East Side supports St Dysmas. We have been long-time partners; and know that it makes a huge difference in the lives of people that don't know Jesus Christ, or have not trusted in him in a long time. Thank you for all you do!

Volunteers are needed for Food to You

East Side Lutheran is the sponsoring organization for the distribution that will take place in our building on <u>Thursday</u>, <u>April 4th</u>. We have the privilege of providing both sponsorship dollars and volunteers. People are needed for 2 shifts: from 4:15-5:15pm, and from 5:15-7:00pm. <u>Sign-up on the board next to the church office</u>.

In March, 137 households were served (that's 522 people!) 7,513 lbs. of food, plus sandwiches, bread, and other items.... all through the doors of East Side Lutheran. We have become the largest of the 4 distribution sites. *Thank you to all who served in March!*

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

How deep is your love/trust?

Alleluia! He is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia! This is the chorus we ring out on Easter. We do this, because the events that have taken place throughout Holy Week have changed our lives. In Jesus' suffering, death, and resurrection the power of death has been defeated and we no longer need to fear. God has got us! And, that includes you. Alleluia! Do you trust this?

During Wednesdays in Lent, we spent time living with some of the "40 Stories" in the Bible... that is, stories that include 40 days and 40 nights, or even 40 years. We did this because this is often the way the Bible talks about the time it takes for "transformation".

We found that when we get down to it, transformation usually centers on a deepening of *trust*: trust that God will sustain and preserve creation, trust that God will make us a new people, trust that God will help us face and do hard things...

Still, "trust" (even trust in God) is something that many of us often struggle with. I think this is because it ultimately means relying on something *outside* of ourselves. After Jesus' resurrection, He addressed this difficulty to trust by showing Himself to the disciples, AND by promising them the Holy Spirit. He did not leave them alone.

This Easter, we remember that in your baptism YOU have received the gift of the Holy Spirit. God's power is at work in you to bring God's Kingdom to the lives of other people by the way we live with them. Think about how good you feel when you do that! That is really living. We are able to live this way, because we trust that God has already got us! Loving God is shown by living in ways that demonstrate that we trust Him. Remember we are in this...
