

President's Promptings



East Side Lutheran Congregation Council Meeting Nov 10, 2024

Present: Ray Schut, Jon Cisar, Carla Middlen, Brian Ensberg, Todd Brower, Brenda Schut, Gwen Oakland, Michael Molland, and Pastor Layne Nelson. Excused Absence Danielle Champa.

President Ray Schut called the meeting to order at 11:15.

Opening Devotion - Pastor Layne Nelson led the council in devotions. The council members shared what was going on in their lives and their present feelings. He opened the meeting with prayer.

Secretary's Report: It was moved by Brian Ensberg; seconded by Brenda Schut to approve the minutes from the October 13, 2024, Council Meeting. Motion Carried.

President's Report: President Schut reported on the upcoming "Thanks for Giving Meal" November 17. Food has been ordered with adjustments made based on last years meal. WELCA will serve and council and volunteers will help with cleaning.

Pastors' Report: Pastor Nelson reported on the events of last month. He presided at two baptisms and one wedding, less than the preceding months. Confirmation, All Saints Sunday, New Members Sunday, and Sunday School Bible distribution made this a busy month.

Upcoming events include Thanksgiving worship with pie social following, Advent worship with meals, and the busy Christmas season with Music Sunday and SS Christmas Program on Dec. 15.

Council Positions: To better balance the needs of the church with council members available time, two council members desired to exchange duties.

It was moved by Jon Cisar; seconded by Carla Middlen to accept the resignations of Brian Ensberg as Evangelism member, and Brenda Schut as Treasure. Motion Carried.

It was moved by Jon Cisar; seconded by Carla Middlen to appoint Brian Ensberg as Treasurer, and Brenda Schut to Evangelism, both until the Annual Congregation meeting. Motion Carried.

Financial Report: Treasurers Brenda Schut and Brian Ensberg jointly presented the following financial report: Projections indicate there will be a \$32,948.50 deficit at year end. The financial report in the newsletter will show the congregation how these projections were determined. More information will also be available during the "Thanks for Giving Meal" on November 17. The Council reviewed all the financial reports.

It was moved by Carla Middlen; seconded by Gwen Oakland that the Treasurers report be approved. Motion Carried.

Treasurer Ensberg presented updated budget planning for 2025.

There are some categories that we are waiting for updated numbers. The congregation will be presented four budget options:

continuing present staffing levels, 2] present levels plus a youthcoordinator, 3] present level plus a part time Associate Pastor, or 4] present level plus a youth coordinator and a part time Associate Pastor. The numbers are being refined and finalized.

Committees: Stewardship & Visioning – Jon Cisar reported the Stewardship Task Force held their last cottage meeting to gather more insight into our 2025 stewardship drive focus. A letter will be sent out this week that includes the amount of the budget we are short this year plus what is needed in November and December.

Education – Gwen Oakland reported Sunday School is going well, offering envelopes were given out to our students, confirmation is going well. Trunk-or-Treat had an amazing attendance, and we ran out of candy twice. The Sunday School Christmas program will be on 12/15/24 at 5:30. Eggstravaganza will be Saturday, April 12.

Outreach – Danielle Champa reported in written report:

Danielle represented our congregation on Tuesday, Nov 5
during a discussion with Mayor Tenhaken where he addressed needs of our community. He stated a large number of poor flock to our city because we are generous people. East Side held the mobile food pantry at the church on Nov. 7, with a high numbers of guests.

Evangelism – Brian Ensberg reported that during new member Sunday we will be receiving five new families into our congregation.

Fellowship – Carla Middlen reported that Bingo will be held on Sunday, March 2 between 2 and 4 pm. They are still seeking more prizes. All are welcome and it is open to all ages.

Property – Todd Brower reported on ongoing furnace repairs. He is still gathering information on possibly converting our boiler to a forced air system.

New Business – The council set the Congregational Annual Meeting date for Sunday, February 16. The Council discussed appointing a nominating committee.

The Council discusses promotion and advertising for Christmas events. Members were asked to help the Altar Guild prepare the building for Christmas on Nov 30.

President Schut adjourned the meeting at 12:45 pm.

The next meeting will be on December 15 at 11:15 am.

Portrait of a Spiritual Quest

a new series interviewing ESL members, by ESL members

AUTHOR'S NOTE: This brief profile of a member of East Side Lutheran Church is presented here because these folks are in the pews and you have noticed them for an hour each week. You are often aware when they are in church and when they are not because their presence shapes a bit of your sense of belonging in this faith community. This story may offer an insight, a bit of inspiration or answer a question you've wanted to ask.

Bob Folschow (performing as Bob LaRoy) tours the area from Inwood, IA to Dell Rapids, SD and points in between playing songs of a generation shaped by the assassination of John F. Kennedy and the Vietnam War.

Few in LaRoy's audience know that as a teenager he was part of a Minneapolis garage band that hit the big time, recorded a best seller—a song that would surface again in the Hollywood movie, "Good Morning, Vietnam." The internet has a clip of the fresh-faced kid from Minneapolis singing the song that made the band famous: "Liar, Liar." It's there, hiding fame in plain sight.

For most in the audience, however, the familiar lyrics and tunes offered by LaRoy are what they needed to hear. The songs stir memories of a when they were young. When the concert is over they thank him for providing a few good memories.

Those kind comments are music to Laroy's ears. "Music is still in my life; it is the first of my enduring loves," LaRoy says. And it is through music he finds a way – as he always did – to meet people and start conversations.

And for 27 years boys and girls riding on Sioux Falls school buses had no idea the old guy behind the wheel played music with iconic performers of the 60s and 70s; all with names their grandparents knew by heart: The Animals, The Beach Boys ("nice bunch of guys"), Sonny and Cher, and Glenn Campbell.

LaRoy retired as a Sioux Falls school bus driver and thought he would retire from performing as well. "I told my wife, Jan, I'm getting too old for this." And he stuck to that proclamation for seven years before Jan said he needed to get out of the house. So she started booking him to play in nursing homes. "There isn't a Good Sam place I haven't played in the area".

Jan's decision and Bob's acquiescence ended up being "frosting on the cake" in Bob's mind. He was entertaining again, just the way he entertained troops on a ship bound for Vietnam. Laroy was drafted but opted for a third year so he had a bit of control over options for service in the army. During the process of discovering his aptitudes LaRoy's musical background in music was discovered as well and put to use in the field. LaRoy was able to bring his amplifier and guitar on the troop ship and used it to entertain troops as they headed to Cameron Bay and the jungle war that swallowed up a generation of men and women. Once in Vietnam, LaRoy formed a band, "Group Therapy" and would be flown by helicopter to remote corners of the countryside to play the songs of the day. "The most popular was 'We got to get out of this place' and 'Hang on Sloopy'". And when popular music changed, so did the tunes LaRoy performed. Laroy's harmonica and guitar skills were perfectly suited to the sounds of another Minnesota kid, Bob Dylan.

In the makeshift venues in Vietnam LaRoy compares some of the songs he performed with his band to ammunition: "some were duds and some hit home."

After years of what LaRoy describes alternatively as "reckless abandon" and "reckless abandonment" he found another venue for his talents and a place of renewal: East Side Lutheran Church.

"It's a God-thing that brings people together."

"What we need is already here." May God bless YOU with a deep sense of peace as you live your faith. And may Joy, Hope, Peace, and Love... the gifts of Advent, take on flesh for you this Christmas.
