Finance Committee Minutes January 16, 2025 Respectfully submitted, Brian Ensberg

Present: Pam Alexander, Doug Gravning, Doug Jacobson, Brian Ensberg, Pastor Layne Nelson, Wayne Wosje.

Opening Prayer: Brian Ensberg began the meeting with prayer.

2024 Budget Outcome: The 2024 fiscal year ended with a surplus of \$55,315. The successful appeal and expense control made this possible. Over \$159,000 was contributed in November and December. \$34,666 of this was directly attributed to the appeal. In addition, the Eckert gift of \$30,000 to operations during the first quarter played a pivotal role in budget success.

2025 Proposed Budget: The 2025 budget represents a vision of the congregation. Budgeted growth over 2024 offerings is 19.3%. Budgeted growth over 2024 total revenue (less \$64,666 one- time gifts) is 12.9%. Budgeted increase in personnel expense is \$34,094. This includes raises for 7 staff, a part time new office position, additional pulpit supply funds and additional training funds. Total personnel expense as a percentage of total revenue is 51.7% which is within the acceptable range for Church personnel costs. Benevolence support will increase from \$3,536 to \$7,440. Budgeted property expense remains high. After discussion, Pam Alexander made a motion to approve the 2025 budget and move it on to the Church Council for approval. Doug Jacobson seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Cell Tower Lease Review: The current American Tower lease generates \$1,453.44 per month which is deposited into the Endowment Fund. Our current lease runs to 2038. American Tower would like to double their footprint for a new generator. They have offered a one-time payment of \$4,000 and \$350 per month for each group they add. They may add 3 to 4 groups.

Doug Jacobson has been negotiating with American Tower on East Side Lutheran's behalf. Doug reported that American Tower has agreed to a one-time payment of \$4,750 and \$475 per month with a 3% escalator. This could generate \$1,425 to \$1,900 per month in addition to the original agreement. The agreement will run until 2038. They do not need additional space from what has been proposed. After discussion, Doug Jacobson made a motion to proceed with an additional cell tower agreement and move it on to the Church Council for approval. Doug Gravning seconded the motion. The motion carried.

The Finance Committee did not make a recommendation as to where the new revenue would go. Options discussed are the endowment fund and the general operating budget.

East Side Lutheran Congregation Council Meeting January 19, 2025

Present: Ray Schut, Jon Cisar, Danielle Champa, Brian Ensberg, Todd Brower, Brenda Schut, Gwen Oakland, Michael Molland, and Pastor Layne Nelson. Excused Absence Carla Middlen

President Ray Schut called the meeting to order at 11:12.

Opening Devotion - Pastor Layne Nelson led the council in devotions. He distributed an article from 1959 of the early history from the East Side LC Ladies Aid. He opened the meeting with prayer.

Secretary's Report: Jon Cisar moved; Gwen Oakland seconded to approve the minutes from the December 15, 2024, Council Meeting. Motion Carried.

President's Report: President Schut reported on upcoming events in February. February 2 will be consecration day, new member Sunday, and our inaugural cribbage tournament. He reported that the ESLC website will be updated. The website will have a link to order ESLC branded products. He reminded council members that their annual report articles are due this week.

Pastors' Report: Pastor Nelson reported on the events of last month. He reported on changes in staffing assignments, there were three funerals this last month, and he thanked Pastors Kari Sansgaard and Ray Heidenson for providing pulpit assistance this last month.

Upcoming events include the second stewardship mailing with Consecration Sunday and New Member Sunday on Sunday February 2. The ESLC Annual Meeting will be on February 16.

He lifted up the outstanding work the Altar Guild this past Christmas season. Planning is underway with new decorations for Christmas 2025. Temple talks are also scheduled for January. Ash Wednesday is March 5 this year.

Financial Report: Treasurer Brian Ensberg presented the following financial report: November/December Offerings were over \$159,000, an outstanding response by the congregation to the year-end appeal. We were able to rebuild the cash flow reserves and end the year at \$55,315 in the black. The key to this was a close annual expense control as well as member's generosity. Property expenses during the cold winter months are always high.

Brenda Schut moved; Danielle Champa seconded to approve the Treasurers report. Motion Carried

The Finance Committee met on January 16 and closely reviewed all money matters for the Congregation. They passed two motions for the council to act upon, the 2025 budget and the updated Cell Tower lease.

Brian Ensberg moved; Gwen Oakland seconded that the Cell Tower lease agreement update, negotiated by Doug Jacobson on behalf of the congregation, the council, and the Finance Committee be approved. The additional income (\$4750.00 onetime and \$475.00 per month additional payments) use designation will be determined later. Motion Carried. reviewed by the finance committee. The budget reflects goals that are important to the congregation driven by listening sessions, congregational responses to our survey, and the Stewardship Task force. The budget is 12.9% growth over 2024 (less 2024 one time gifts).

There are slight increases in personnel expenses that reflect the needs of the congregation as well as the outstanding work of all our staff during the year 2024. There are funds for another half time office person that allows the present staff to accomplish their assigned tasks.

Gwen Oakland moved; Jon Cisar seconded that the Budget be approved and presented to the congregation at the annual meeting for approval. Motion Carried.

Committees: Stewardship & Visioning – Jon Cisar reported the Stewardship Task met on January 7th reviewing our 2025 "Together in Faith" pledge drive. The first letter has been sent, and the follow-up letter with a congregational full color foldout brochure and pledge cards will be sent this week. Each week leading up to Commitment Sunday February 2 will have a mission moment at the start of service with a member of the church sharing a brief message.

Education – Gwen Oakland reported Sunday School and confirmation are going well. Planning is underway for the Eggstravaganza.

Outreach– Danielle Champa reported there were once again a large turnout 117 grateful families for January 2 "Food to you". 155 people were helped with the Church on the Street Frybread distribution in our parking lot.

Evangelism – Brenda Schut reported that we will be holding new member classes January 28 with new member reception on February 2. Tools for members to use for ESLC Evangelism are being developed.

Property – Todd Brower reported on approved boiler expenses as well as this summer's conversion to forced air heat and AC for the sanctuary. There are planned cement work for the summer for the islands in the parking lot. Members who want to contribute to help defray the cost may do so.

New Business As per IRS regulations, we need a yearly motion to designate what part of Pastor Nelson's compensation is housing allowance. Brian Ensberg moved; Gwen Oakland seconded that \$44,690.00 be designated as housing allowance for Pastor Nelson. Motion Carried. The council had an ongoing discussion on the upcoming annual meeting scheduled for February 16. Discussed were the nominations need and the elections. The agreement with our Boy Scout troop 208 has been renewed.

The council set April 27 as the date to invite Katie Chapman, Shetek Lutheran Ministries presented information on their ongoing capital campaign.

President Schut adjourned the meeting at 12:41 pm

Portrait of a Spiritual Quest



AUTHOR'S NOTE: This brief profile of a member of East Side Lutheran Church is presented here because these folks are in the pews and you have noticed them for an hour each week. You are often aware when they are in church and when they are not because their presence shapes a bit of your sense of belonging in this faith community. This story may offer an insight, a bit of inspiration or answer a question you've wanted to ask.

Grace Peterson knows a thing or two about competition. She likes it. And she's good at it—in the classroom and on the basketball court.

"I grew up watching my brothers play. I would go to all their games," and rather quickly it became clear to Grace that she could do what her brothers did. So she began playing basketball. Her interest was blessed by a sunny attitude, physical strength and sufficient height; as a senior at Washington High School she sees the world from the vantage of a 6-foot-tall athlete.

That combination will take her to Augustana University next fall where she plans to play basketball and pursue a degree in special education. "I want to be a teacher," for students with unique physical needs so they can learn to play a game of their choice.

And although she likes winning, she prefers to work for it. Grace argues the more challenging the opposition, the better her effort becomes. She is not a fan of an easy win but a fan of playing well.

What's true at home and school is also true for Grace at East Side Lutheran Church. She has been part of our church community since forever. Her grandmother, Carla Middlen, has been an active member as well and has served as a role mode at church and on the basketball court. Grace's grandmother coached volleyball and that experience served as a common language encouraging, advising and directing the development of Grace, the contender.

"She taught me to believe in myself." And that lesson is delivered in regular conversations and texts after every game. "She was always there for me," Grace says.

Grace applies that experience to how she functions as a team member now. She knows she can't play basketball alone. She can't learn without teachers. She can't flourish without family. She knows she is good at what she does because others have made it happen. And for all of them, she prays.

"At night, I reflect on my day and the people I met throughout the day." It's a thought prayer, not just

something she memorized. She remembers people who are sick. Her teammates. Classmates. Her family. And her grandmother who had a part teaching that routine. She watched her pray and follows the example of keeping others in mind.

And there is one other thing: Grace believes whatever talents she has are on loan from God.
